This decision was warmly welcomed by the Committee and also by the La Trobe Society.

Perhaps this would be a good opportunity to bring the grandchildren along for a visit to the Cottage, with a picnic and a blanket if it's fine.

Melbourne Open House La Trobe's Cottage, along with Tasma Terrace, is to be part of the Melbourne Open House program on 24/25 July, an event which has proved extremely popular during the two years it has been in operation. This will be a great opportunity to raise the profile of the Cottage - it will feature in the event program, and although house entry will be free, the publicity and coverage will be worth a lot. La Trobe's Garden

We are pleased to announce that Neil Robertson, former CEO of the Open Garden Scheme, has agreed to be our garden ambassador. He will support the work that the Garden group is doing, and will promote the garden. The garden is approaching winter and we are preparing the site for our heritage apples to be planted in June or July and the heritage roses will be planted under the drawing room and bedroom windows. We will be also dotting some New Zealand flax through the garden as in Edward La Trobe Batman's paintings.

I have also made contact with the Royal Horticultural Society of Victoria (RHSV), of which La Trobe was first patron, and have invited them to a visit our cottage.

We are hoping to organise a propagation workshop with Friends of Burnley Gardens. We need help to locate some succulents and shrubs to propagate: *Aloe plicatilis plicatilis* (Fan aloe); *Aloe arborescens* (Krantz aloe); *Kalanchoe pinnata* (Air plant); *Agave Americana* (Century plant); *Hibiscus syriacus* (Hibiscus); *Prostanthera sp.* (Native mint).
