The annual service celebrating the life of Charles Joseph La Trobe will take place at St Peter's Eastern Hill on Sunday 7 December at 10.30am. This year we celebrate the 150th Anniversary of La Trobe's death on 4 December 1875. Eleven hours later a corresponding service will take place at St Michael the Archangel, Litlington, Sussex, where La Trobe is buried. The La Trobe Society will be providing a bunch of Australian flowers for that service. All are welcome to attend the service at St Peter's Eastern Hill.



As always, a Moravian Star has been placed at the top of our Christmas tree. The very first Moravian Star is known to have originated in the 1830s at a Moravian school in Germany and as the La Trobes were dedicated members of the Moravian Church, it would certainly have enjoyed the honoured place at the very top of the family's tree in Melbourne. (Moravian stars are frequently white, or red and white, but ours is black.)
